This is a great time to do so...and we continually go to auctions looking for more glass and portrait porcelains.



Fenton's Feather Stitch Bowl By Alan & Lorraine Pickup Originally written in October of 1995.

Edward's Standard Encyclopedia of Carnival Glass states "this pattern is a kissing cousin of the well-known Coin Dot design." We agree, but would like to take that statement one step further. The mould for this pattern was very possibly the Coin Dot mould that was sent back to the mold shop and retooled to create a new design that we know today as Feather Stitch. First, let me say that there are two different moulds for the Coin Dot bowl. One has eight coin dots in the center and the other has a seven coin dot center. Obviously the Feather Stitch mold was created from the latter. By comparing the basic glass colors, iridescence and available shapes, both Coin Dot bowls appear to be Fenton products.

Several years ago during a discussion with Frank Fenton, he informed us that moulds were re-tooled creating new designs. He was talking at the time about adding hobs to many older molds to keep the Hobnail glass line going. Competition between glass makers was intense and in order to keep one's share of the glass market, new designers were in constant demand. The cost of making the moulds was a big expense and if an existing mould could be changed to create a new design, it was very cost effective to do so.



FENTON'S COIN DOT BOWL

Read Joan Doty's article in the April 1994 Texas Carnival Glass Newsletter. Her observations on Fenton's Long Thumbprint and Long Hobnail vases states, "It is as though a Long Thumbprint mould had hobnails cut into each of the thumbprints." She also pictures a Fenton Knotted Beads vase. These look to me like hobs were added to the Diamond and Rib vase moulds.

We recently found a green Feather Stitch bowl with the 3-1 candy ribbon edge. A shape that we have collected for many years. Feather Stitch is not a frequently seen pattern in green and the first 3-1 edge Feather Stitch bowl we have seen. Most of the thirty seven 3-1 bowls on our wall are Fenton and Dugan patterns, so a detail comparison of the Coin Dot and Feather Stitch bowls was easily made. The addition of the six small flowers, and the connecting wreath, plus add the stitching between the stippled coin dots and Presto – a new pattern is born.

We feel another mould that was re-tooled was the popular Holly and Rib compote. This small compote that is easily found in any antique mall today, and in many colors, was probably recreated by cutting the holly and berries into a slow selling Rib compote. We have to presume the small Rib compote was a slow seller in its day because of their scarcity today. On the other hand, the Holly and Rib compote must have been a big success from their abundant availability today. Apparently the Feather Stitch bowl was not enough of a pattern change to whip up much excitement among the buyers as they are rather scarce today.

April 2006 – The 3-1 green Feather Stitch is still hanging on the wall. This bowl like all our glass has a story. We were in an antique shop on the way to KC one year and Tom Burns walked in, also buying on his way to KC. I had this bowl in my hand and Tom was too anxious for me to set it down so we bought it. Although it has a burnt spot right in the center I felt it was at least very scarce as Tom has a good eye for rarity. Tom is an amazing guy. Although we had met only a couple of times previous to this encounter he could remember what I had mail bid on in one of his last auctions.





Horse Head Medallion

A review by Jerry Kudlac

Fenton's Horse Head Medallion pattern first appeared in custard glass about 1915, followed by carnival glass, and then in pink depressions glass in 1930. The design consists of five circular medallions (horse heads) with a background of petals. The pattern is found in 7 – 8 inch plates and bowls with a collar base or with three ball feet. Bowls may be ruffled, round, ice cream; jack-in-the-pulpit, nut bowl and rosebowl shape and found in over a dozen different colors. The rarest being a red Rosebowl that sold for \$9000 in 1995.

Recently, I purchased an old print of the 1848 painting *Pharaoh's Horses* by John Frederick Herring, Sr. (1795-1865) at a local carnival glass auction. Fenton's Horse Head Medallion pattern is a stylized version of this painting in reverse (a mirror image). After finding the print was unsuitable for reframing, an internet search resulted in not only finding another print; but also, an interesting story about its' popularity, symbolism, and origin. Historically, horses have been a symbol of wealth, status and power since biblical times. The inspiration for the printing is thought to be the Egyptian horses used by pharaoh's chariots in pursuit of the Israelites into the Red Sea.

Herring first exhibited the painting, entitled A Study, in 1848, at the British Institute, the following year he changed the title to Pharaoh's Horses. Later, it became a very popular engraving and marketing logo in American and Europe. A framed engraving referred to as Horse Heads, attributed to Rosa Bonheur, sold for 75 cents in the 1902 Sears, Roebuck and Co catalog. The artist's name usually remained obscure as unauthorized images were copied. The Herring painting sold for the first time in 1986, at Christie's auction house of London for \$445,000. It is now in another private collection.

Interestingly, the design was found in a tattoo archive collection indicating it has also been popular with tattoo artists for over 100 years. By the 1920s, it was advertised in tattoo suppliers' catalogs along with other classic religious-art designs and as the cover for a how-to-tattoo booklet.

Herring's, painting was thought to be the oldest rendition of *Pharaoh's Horses* until 1987, when Randall E. Tyree, an artist from Leslie, Missouri purchased an old unsigned painting of Arabian horses for \$25 at the Sullivan flea market. The McCrone Research Institute of Chicago was commissioned to analyze the painting after Christie's auction house stated the painting was a copy. Dr. Walter McCrone, well-know for his examination of the "Shroud of Turin" and works by Rembrandt and Manet, stated that the handwoven canvas predated the Industrial Revolution of the 1820s' and the paint pigments dated to 1704, indicating the painting to be 100 years or more older than Herring's

version.

Tyree then traced the ownership of the painting to a local Carver family who immigrated to the US in 1915, from Disington, Cumbria, in northern England where it had hung in the tavern called "The Boot". Oliver Beckett, a Herring & Sons art historian, examined the painting and stated that Herring, Sr. was a stagecoach driver in that area of northern England while developing his craft as an equine artist and it may have the inspiration for his version of the painting. Both paintings feature three identically posed charging white Arabian horses, but with a few differences. The unsigned painting is a 24 x 24 inch square canvas that conveys a sense of power, motion and fear of the horses being overcome by dark clouds and drowning in a stormy sea. The unsigned version made its first public appearance in 1999, when Tyree issued a limited-edition lithograph. Herring's version was painted on a 30 inch circular canvas; but conveys the horses in more placid mood with a blue sky and calm seas. Since the mid-1880s, it has been the source of the classical "Horse Head" design.

We now own a new print of Herring's painting as well as Tyree's lithograph to augment our glass collection. Tyree is writing a book entitled "The Mystery of Pharaoh's Horses" describing his investigation and authentication of the painting. Ironically, a number of rare pieces of carnival glass have followed a similar path of discovery and documentation. Who would have known that carnival glass was part of an interesting who-did-it story?


Western Thistle


Do to health reasons they are selling their glass on June 10th, 2006 at the Mickey Reichel Auction Center in Boonville, Missouri.

Princess Lamp

The base on this interesting lamp was made by the U.S. Glass Company and is sometimes found with a cloth shade.

The lamp pictured above is the other way the lamp is found. It has a Lined Lattice vase with a hole cut in the center and turned upside down for a shade. Lined Lattice was made by the Dugan Glass Company. One wonders, if a distributor bought the base and the shade and combined them. However you find the lamp it is desirable and has electric iridescence. They are found in marigold and purple, with purple being the most desirable. They can sell anywhere from \$350.00 to \$800.00.

Diamonds

Made by the Millersburg Glass Company.

Simple design of large diamonds with a zipper like border.

Pitcher are only about 7 inches tall. Most common color is green.

Other colors found have been amethyst, marigold, & aqua teal.

There are only a few punch bowls & bases known. The punch above sold in 2000 for \$6,000.00. There is also one spittoon whimsey made from a tumbler.





Double Star

Made by the Cambridge Glass Company
The pattern has two types of stars on the trunk. It has a whirling star and a small hobstar. Some pieces are marked with "Nearcut".

Most common color is green, but also found in amethyst & marigold. Only known in water sets. The whimsey spitoon is a rarity made from a tumbler. It sold in 1999 for \$3,900.00. Some feel that the Buzz Saw cruets are actually this pattern, but Alan & Lorraine Pickup think they are different, though similar pattern.

Diamond & Starburst

Made by the Imperial Glass Company
Found only in wine sets which usually include decanter, stopper & six
wine glasses. Damaged or missing stopper can greatly reduce the value.

Found in marigold & purple.

Marigold sets will bring \$135.00 to \$160.00. Purple sets will bring \$400.00 to \$800.00.



Double Diamond

Made by Josef Inwald of Czechoslovakia.

Double Diamond has two diamonds or three x's in an oval.

Items made were a tumbler up & dresser set pictured.

The dresser set includes a ring tree, pin dish, cologne bottle & perfume. Found only in marigold. Tumbler up and two perfumes sold on ebay in 2004 for \$103.00.


