Romeo & Juliet Plate

I wrote an article sometime ago about this plate, but felt like it should come out again.

Roland & I went to Oklahoma City many years ago & while rummaging around in one antique shop, found this plate. It's unusual & neither of us had seen one before. We bought it & kept wondering its history. I wrote Mr. Fenton & the letter following is his reply. On the front at the top it has lettering Romeo & Juliet. At the bottom it has Valentines Day 1972. On the back appears these words: "Famous Lovers", the Fenton Logo, No. 1 in an annual series of collector's plates commerating Valentines day. Underneath in very very small letters, the words" "Kensinton Glass and China Company".

Dear Don:

Thanks for your letter of July 16th about the Romeo and Juliet plate. Back about 1972, a lady named Louise Goldstein came to us to see if we would make a special plate. She wanted to start a series of plates which she was going to call the Famous Lovers series. She had a business named the Kensington Glass and China Company located somewhere in the Baltimore, Maryland area.

We agreed to make the first plate, Romeo and Juliet. She wanted them made in Carnival Glass and in an opaque blue color. I think Tony Rosena designed the plate for her, but I'm not sure of that. She may have had her own design.

Anyway, we took the order, but during production of the Carnival Glass plate, we had a lot of trouble with plates cracking. It appeared that there were very thick and very thin places in the bottom of the plate, so one portion of the plate was cooling faster than the other. We had a great deal of difficulty. After several tries with no success, we told Mrs. Goldstein that we just could not make it in Carnival. The blue pieces turned out alright, but evidently the process of spraying the pieces added an extra stress that caused the production difficulties.

The base color of the Carnival Glass plate was a transparent orange color, not really amber. Then we iridized that. It was the same coloring we had in our regular line at that time. We called it Orange Carnival.

That's about all I can remember about it except that we did make a fair number of the cpaque blue pieces but only a few of the Orange Carnival.

I don't think the project was very successful for the Kensington Company, so they decided not to proceed with the rest of the series.



Frank M. Fenton December 1st, 1915 - August 9th, 2005



Williamstown, West Virginia (AP) – Frank M. Fenton, the longtime president of Fenton Art Glass and son of its founder, died August 9th, 2005. He was 89.


Fenton, the fifth child and first son of Frank L. Fenton, was born December 1st, 1915. He attended grade school in Williamstown, but crossed over the Ohio River to Marietta, Ohio, to attend high school. He entered Marietta College in September 1932 and graduated with a bachelor of arts degree in 1936.

He began working for the family company while in college. He tried several times to get a summer job at the factory, but his father turned him down, saying others needed the work more than he did. Finally, he was given a position by his uncle.

For nearly four decades, Frank along with his brother Bill headed Fenton Art Glass.

"He was a great leader and certainly provided a lot of support and advice," said his son George Fenton, CEO and current president of Fenton Art Glass. "He was personally very caring and, in business, very wise and very astute."

PRAYER RUG BON-BON

Prayer Rug in Carnival over Custard Glass

The "Prayer Rug" pattern is described and illustrated in Hartung Book 8 page 45. It is also shown in color in Bill Edwards book on "The Early Years of Fenton Carnival Glass". Both authors list it as being rare. It was made by the Fenton Art Glass Company and is listed only in the two handled bon-bon pictured.

It has a beautiful iridized marigold overlay on true custard glass. The base glass is different from the marigold overlay milk glass and moonstone pieces. It is also decidedly different from the peach opalescent glass that was made by Dugan-Diamond and in somewhat lesser amounts of Fenton and Westmoreland. You will occasionally see these "Prayer Rug" bon-bons in custard without the iridescence, but to find one in Carnival glass is a rarity.

Vintage Banded

The Vintage Banded pattern is described as a "Grape and Leaf design with two bands of diagonal lines", one band at the top and one band at the bottom of the mug or pitcher It is similar to Dugan's Vintage perfume and powder jar, but with two bands. The Vintage Banded mug was shown in the Butler Brothers catalog from 1922 through 1930, which would indicate that it was made during the Diamond period. It was advertised as "Iridescent Mug - 7 oz., handled grape embossed, golden iridescent - 1 doz. Pkg. \$1.15".


The Vintage Banded mug is considered to be one of the most common mugs found in carnival glass, but there are some rarities in this pattern. The only amethyst mug that has been documented is shown on page 146 of Carl O. Burn's book, "Dugan and Diamond Carnival Glass 1909-1931". A rare smoke colored mug sold in 2003 for \$900. John Britt reported several examples of light green mugs with marigold iridescence and David Doty's web site reports an aqua or powder blue mug selling in 2004.






I have been able to find several mugs in light green with marigold iridescence and one in a dark pink glass with marigold iridescence. The color of the glass can usually be seen by looking at the base and the lower band of the mug but it can be difficult to see. The lower band of the mug seems to have the least amount of iridescence. Other times the handle will have little to no iridescence and the color can be seen there as well. The marigold iridescence on the mug, like most carnival glass, will vary from a light marigold to a dark orange. The light green and pink mugs that I have found seem to have the darkest iridescence. For comparison, three mugs are shown in the photographs are: crystal or clear glass with marigold iridescence, light green glass with marigold iridescence and pink glass with marigold iridescence.

So far, I haven't found the powder blue, smoke or an amethyst mug, but you never know when or where you might find them.





Northwood's Butterfly Bon Bon

The Northwood "Butterfly" bon-bons were made with a smooth or plain exterior as well as the more rare threaded back type that is pictured here.



Unusual Reverse Pattern

The plain back examples have been reported in amethyst, blue, marigold, purple and green. One has been found in a true smoke color. The threaded or ribbed back examples are known in purple, marigold, green electric blue and ice blue. The purple example is seen more often with the ice blue example being the most rare. They are desirable in any color.

The different variations found in Carnival glass patterns have always been amazing and interesting. Actually, there are hundreds of these variants throughout the entire Carnival glass field. It is quite understandable why a different company would produce a somewhat varied version of a given piece of glass. It is less explainable, however, and certainly very interesting, why the same manufacturer would make these variations in the same piece of glass.



The beautiful handled "Northwood's Butterfly" bon-bons have a Large butterfly in the center of the bon-bon. The butterfly sits on a background of alternating plain and stippled rays. Usually these bon-bons are plain or smooth on the reverse side. The variant has the threaded back. Both types contain the underlined "N" in a circle pressed into center of the underside of the base. This threaded type is most often seen in purple. Three of these have been seen in ice blue and are considered rare. None have been found in aqua opal, white or pastel green, but it is possible that they might exist. In any color, they are indeed a very fine piece of Carnival glass and would add to any collection.

Fruits & Flowers Bon Bon With the Stippled Background

The stippling on the background of the "Fruits & Flowers" bonbon is quite visible. These bonbons are usually entirely smooth on the surface behind the pattern (as pictured above). On this stippled variant however, the stippling covers the inside of the bowl except for a space in the center about the size of a silver dollar and an area about ¾ inch wide along the outer edge of the bowl. The stippling actually covers all of the area that is directly behind the "Fruits & Flowers" pattern. These stippled variants come in marigold and cobalt blue. They may also exist in other colors.

"Fruits & Flowers" bon bons contain eight panels that are on the outside of the foot portion of the piece. These panels start at the top of the foot and extend completely down and to the outer edge of the base.

Update – The footed bonbon is the most frequently seen item in Fruits & Flowers. Because it is stemmed, it is occasionally identified as a two-handled compote. Some of the amethyst bonbons are found with a plain exterior rather than basketweave and are more desirable. Aqua opal is a fairly common color in these bonbons. The bonbons were reproduced by Fenton in amethyst. As an example, blue unstippled bonbons sell for between \$90.00 & \$150.00, while the stippled blue bonbon would sell for somewhere around \$500.00.

Waffle & Hobstar - An Imperial Basket

The "Waffle & Hobstar" basket is not listed in any of the Hartung books. It can be found in Presznick Book 2 – plate 286, and was named "Waffle & Hobstar" by the late Mrs. Presznick. This basket is somewhat larger that the regular "Waffle Block" basket. Waffle Block baskets are not only smaller (10 inches high) but they are also much more common. The "Waffle & Hobstar" is 13 inches high to the top of the handle. This handled basket is quite scarce. The few seen were of a good marigold color. In addition to the waffle type blocks that are found on the design of the "Wafffle Block" pattern, "Waffle & Hobstar" also contains rows of daisy like figures or hobstars in its pattern make up.

Update – You won't find this basket under this name. The name now used for this Imperial basket is "Hobstar & Waffle Block". Colors known – Ice Green, Marigold, Smoke & Teal.

Millersburg – Isaac Benesch & Sons

Millersburg, Isaac Benesch & Sons was the first piece of Millersburg that I had ever bought. This was probably 10 or 12 years ago. I had an antique shop & specialized in glass of all kind except for carnival glass. My husband Randy was interested in carnival glass, and that gave him something to look for when I was out hunting for victorian glass, art glass, depression glass, vintage Fenton, opalescent glass, flow blue, Royal Bayreuth, R.S. Prussia, and I just ran out of room, but you probably get the idea. I ended up even writing a book on Victorian Pickle Castors.



After we sold out the shop, I started selling on ebay and sold this advertising piece of Millersburg. Was always sorry, I sold it, so ended up buying one back along with the bon-bon several years later.

Millersburg made two shapes for Isaac Benesch & Sons, ruffled bowls & two handled bon-bons with the Holly pattern on the front, and the words Isaac Benesch 54th Anniversary on the back. Both are fairly easy to find and won't cost you a whole lot of money. Bowls are only found in the amethyst color. There is a rare bowl that is missing the "s" in the word Benesch. I'm sure this was a mistake and was corrected so very few have been found. The bon-bon with the advertising is only found in the marigold color. **Benice**

Northwood's "Wreath of Roses" Bon-Bon

This is a variant, Northwood's version of the "Wreath of Roses" bon-bon. It is sometimes called "Basket of Roses" and "Northwood's Rose Wreath (the name recognized by most collectors). About a dozen of the purple bon-bons with the stippled background have been seen and, are scarce. The purple on below is unsusual in that it has no stippling, just a plain background. The back pattern of this piece, like the stippled version, carries the Basketweave with an "N".


